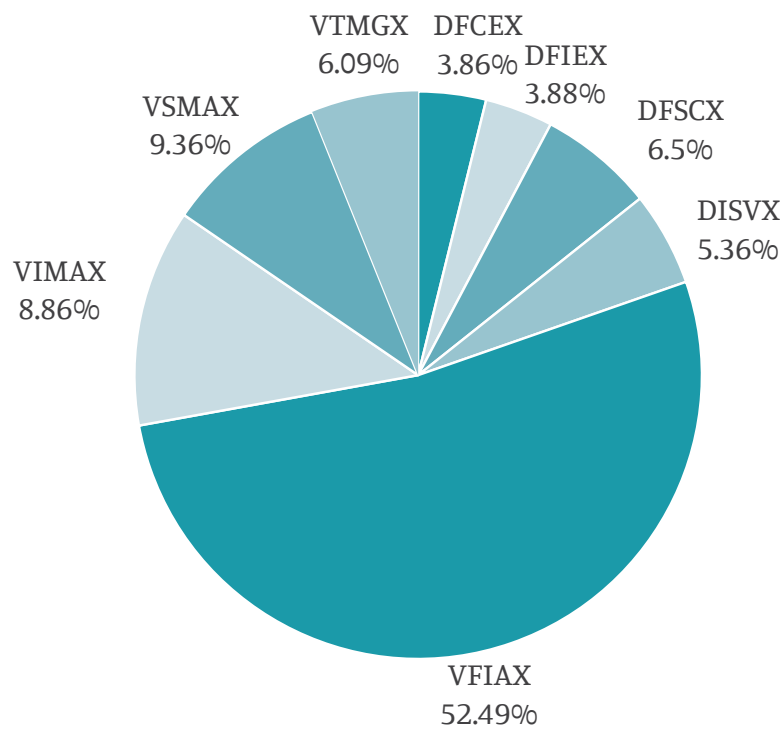

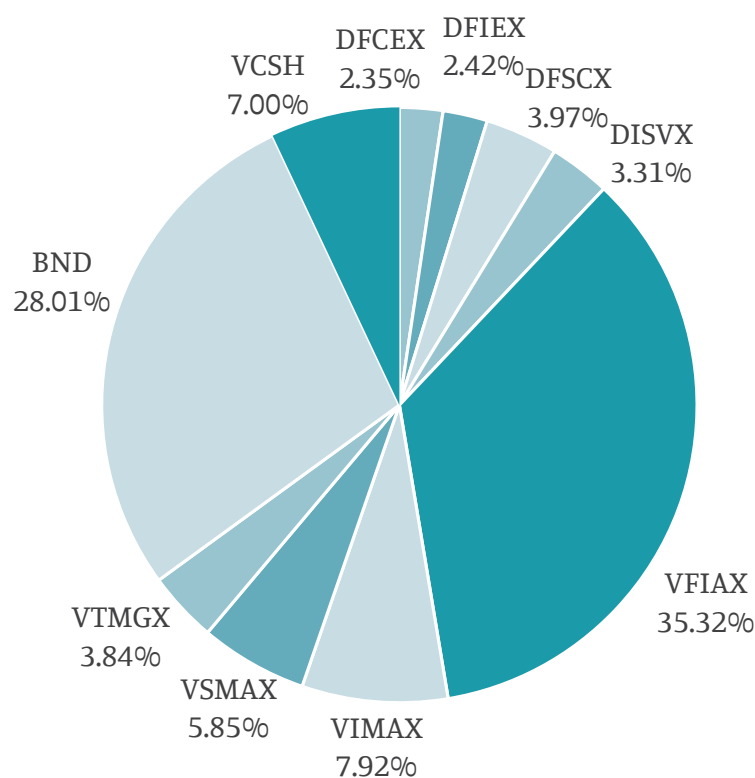

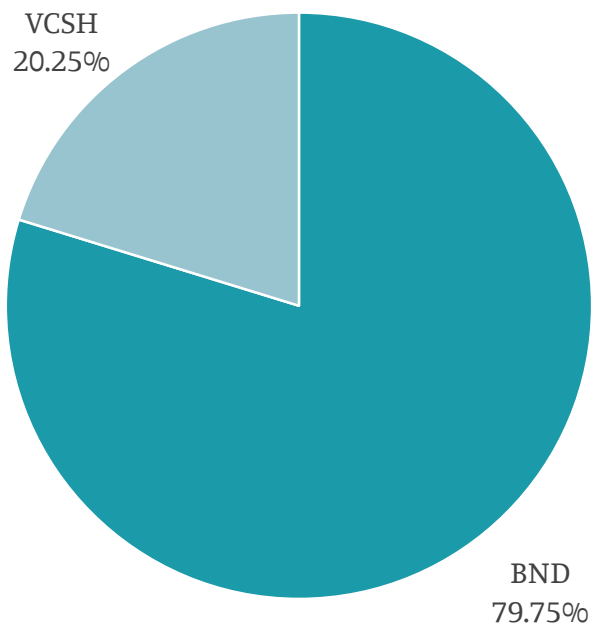

AGENCY FUND CORNER

In honor of our Centennial year, TFEC had planned an Agency Match Campaign that was set to run March 1 through September 1 for those organizations that opted to participate. Due to COVID-19, TFEC and the 16 participating organizations have decided to delay this campaign until 2021. We look forward to a successful campaign next year and another opportunity to help your nonprofits!

During this trying time, your nonprofit organization is playing an important role in our region. Services being provided by your organization are vitally important, and providing these services may have become more difficult due to health safety guidelines and insufficient funds.

TFEC can help. One of the benefits to having your Agency Endowment Fund with TFEC is the option to receive a distribution from your fund each year. In order to better serve your organization, TFEC changed the timeline for these distributions and gave organizations the ability to receive them early. What school are you attending?

Lincoln University located in Chester County, Pennsylvania

What is your major/minor?

Biochemistry, with an Art minor.

Why did you choose that major?

I chose Biochemistry in order to prepare for postgraduate study in medicine. My interest in medicine healing and research is undoubtedly fueled by my science experiences both inside and outside of school. Through these exposures I know that science provides answers to the most perplexing questions.

What year in college are you?

I was fortunate to attend Harrisburg Area Community College (HACC) as a full-time student my senior year of high school. Although I experienced tremendous academic success at HACC, I chose to enroll at Lincoln University, as a freshman.

The Foundation for Enhancing Communities (TFEC), announces that nine TFEC grant opportunities below, will be made available on April 15, 2020, with a deadline of August 1, 2020.

ARTS FOR ALL PARTNERSHIP—The Arts for All Partnership is a partnership between TFEC and the Cultural Enrichment Fund. This unique collaborative funding initiative aims to improve the efficiency of arts grant funding and increase the overall impact of grant funding for arts programming in our communities.

CHILDREN'S HOME FOUNDATION FUND — The mission of the Children's Home Foundation Fund, a fund of TFEC, is to provide aid to economically disadvantaged children in Cumberland, Dauphin, and Perry counties. PEOPLE MAKING A DIFFERENCE, ONE PROJECT AT A TIME: THROUGH EDUCATION

TFEC's mission is to inspire giving by partnering with donors to achieve their charitable goals and strengthen our local communities by investing in them now, and for the future.

TFEC achieves our mission by providing numerous program and services to the community. One of these services is our Fiscal Sponsor Program. As a fiscal sponsor, TFEC enables community projects to invaluable touch the residents in our local communities. These projects provide awareness and support on a variety of community issues: mental health, addiction, domestic violence, chronic illness, historical preservation, community engagement, economic disparity, survivors of trauma, and supporting local nonprofits, just to name a few.

Currently, TFEC supports 72 programs focusing on the following four areas: Community Development, Health and Human Services, Arts & Culture, and Education. In each quarterly newsletter, we will spotlight one of these areas to share the amazing work of TFEC's Community Projects. In this issue, we will be sharing the community impact of Education.

The coronavirus pandemic has uprooted America's K-12 education system, as most schools in every state close their doors for extended periods to combat the spread of the virus. Educators and students are feeling the extraordinary ripple effect as schools close down amidst the public health emergency.

The time of crisis has highlighted that our schools do not just provide education for students but also provide support for families and communities. Education is the common link between higher wages, lower unemployment, reduced incarceration and crime, longer life expectancy and better health, and increased civic engagement.

BENEFITS OF HAVING COMMUNITY SUPPORT FOR EDUCATION

- **Support During a Time of Crisis** — This outbreak of the coronavirus has communities mutually leaning on each other for support. Volunteers are pooling resources and money together in an effort to provide for those who might otherwise be unable to do so by themselves. To support our education system, we see communities working together to make sure students who normally rely on free meals or reduced lunches do not go hungry. To help, many communities have set up ways to distribute meals to children and families. With school moving to online learning platforms, internet connection is vital. We are seeing local internet companies taking immediate steps to help connect more families to the internet. Please check with your local provider to explore what options are available in you area.

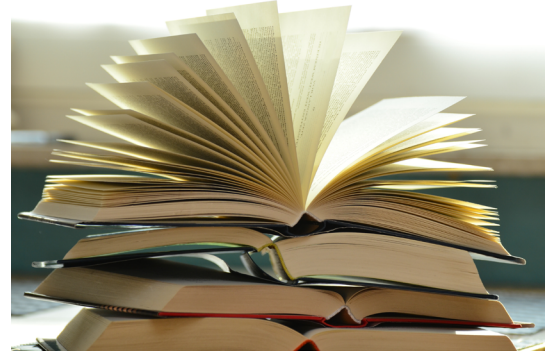

According to a recent policy brief from the National Education Association "when schools, parents, families, and communities work together to support learning, students tend to earn higher grades, attend school more regularly, stay in school longer, and enroll in higher level programs."

COMMUNITY PROJECTS CONTINUED

STUDENT AUTHOR MOVEMENT - PROVIDING MENTORSHIP TO HELP TITLE 1 STUDENTS BRIDGE THE ACHIEVEMENT GAP

How Do Author Visits Help Bridge The Gap Between Title 1 and Non-Title 1 Schools? The National Assessment of Education Progress reported in 2015 that the average fourth grader eligible for free lunch scored a 209 in reading, and the average fourth grader that was not eligible for free lunch scored a 237. That 28-point gap is roughly comparable to being behind by more than two grade levels. The gap is 25 points in eighth grade, which is still considerably large.



The Student Author Movement Project bridges the achievement gap by providing mentorship to help Title 1 students by teaching various techniques of writing, illustration and publishing to inspire new, young writers while enhancing literacy to improve and develop their capabilities.

In short, students meet an author and illustrator and learn about the work that is needed to put a book together. The interactive presentation focuses on the education process of writing, illustrating and publishing. This presentation is based on utilizing a “can-do” attitude that can manifest from within, no matter the age.

The Authors identified by the Project visit students and provide in-person mentorship, allowing students to personally connect and learn real-world skills that can be applied to the classroom for the educational advancement towards a better academic future. The visits create a memorable impression on students at Title 1 schools and help to inspire them to pursue creative endeavors and connect classroom lessons with the broader world. Inspiring tomorrow’s writers today!

Here is a sample of comments received by schools that have participated in the Student Author Movement Project:

- Picture a cafeteria FULL of eight, nine, ten, and eleven year olds focused on their writing with such passion and enthusiasm, asking any adult that walked by to read their work. That was amazing!
- I am eternally grateful for the additional seeds that have been planted. I am looking forward to them blossoming in the near future.
- The afternoon of the presentation, I heard students talking about their story ideas, these were not the students who are considered wordsmiths and walking around with journals — these were the “I hate everything about writing” crowd.
- What a great chance for inner city students to think about their futures beyond what they see in their everyday environment.
- Students that struggle with writing in my classroom came alive with story ideas
- Being educators in a school with a high population of students where writing can present struggles and frustrations, we watch with astonishment as some of our struggling students pour their ideas on to paper with a great sense of pride and interact with one another in a creative manner.

COLLECTIVE IMPACT OF TFEC'S PARTNERSHIP WITH COMMUNITY PROJECTS

TFEC is proud to be the fiscal sponsor of Projects that raise funds to support and/or offer educational activities and/or support in our communities. In 2019, TFEC's fourteen Education Projects raised over \$86,000 for their missions. Here is a sample of the collective impact resulting from the partnership of TFEC and the Community Educational Projects:

- Providing networking and mentorships as a supportive community or post-secondary education, job readiness, and personal growth
- Fundraising efforts to support local educational scholarships
- Fostering trauma informed education practices including resiliency resources that impact a child's ability to grow up happy healthy and safe
- Providing communities with affordable recreational and educational experiences
- Fueling cross-sector collaboratives that recognize access to early learning as crucial to the well-being of employees, children, and the development of a future ready workforce
- Supporting schools to cover costs of books, instructional materials, technology equipment and services, uniforms and activities
- Empowering caregivers, connecting educators and deepening resources that help children enter school ready to learn
- Teaching various techniques of writing, illustration, and publishing to inspire new, young writers, while enhancing literacy
- Establishing a local STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math) infrastructure that improves regional understanding of STEAM initiatives and programs and how they can be leveraged for the common good of individuals and communities

TFEC'S COMMUNITY PROJECTS

As a fiscal sponsor, TFEC enables community projects to invaluablely touch the residents in our local communities.
