Organization History: Do not exceed this page

The Community Health Council of Lebanon County (CHC) was established in 1994 in response to the first Community Health Needs Assessment performed by the (then) Good Samaritan Hospital.

The Community Health Council is a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit entity which coordinates efforts to improve the health and quality of life of Lebanon County residents based on the results of various community needs assessments performed throughout the County. The Community Health Council brings together stakeholders from across the community to discuss common health goals and collaborative opportunities. Currently, the Council consists of over 20 committees, task forces, and events involving over 400 community volunteers.

The diversity of the Board members enhances the Community Health Council's ability to collaborate with various community organizations such as the Single County Authority, youth-serving organizations, schools, government, law enforcement, healthcare, civic groups, the Lebanon County Council of Human Service Agencies, the local Lebanon Valley Chamber of Commerce, the Community of Lebanon Association, and various civic and religious groups. These collaborative relationships assist with community-level change by connecting to local businesses, schools, religious entities, organizations, and community leaders, avoiding duplication of efforts and helping to address public health concerns, violence, and substance use in the county.

The Teen Pregnancy Prevention and Support Network, a task force of CHC, was revitalized in 2008. Its purpose is to address teen pregnancy issues in Lebanon County and to improve the health and well-being of all teens through education, advocacy, and prevention. The goals of the initiative are to raise public awareness about the issues surrounding teen pregnancy in Lebanon County, work with school districts to assess educational needs and implement educational programs that work toward decreasing the frequency of teenage pregnancy, provide education and support to parents who may have difficulty communicating with their children about sexual topics, and to serve as a teenage pregnancy prevention information network.

In the past, this organization has seen outreach success during Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month (May) and Let's Talk Month (October). In fact, teen pregnancy in Lebanon County is down 24% in the last 15 years. Recently, the group has offered scholarships for pregnant women to attend workforce development programs at our local community college.

PROJECT SNAPSHOT

1. Capture your project and the community need it seeks to address in 200 words or less.

Lebanon County is served by several organizations which provide resources to young parents. However, some programs are offered exclusively to mothers, and other programs are only offered to fathers if certain requirements are met. Reaching and relaying information to fathers, establishing paternity, and providing resources to non-biological fathers are barriers in establishing appropriate contact and program delivery to the fathers and young men of Lebanon County. For example, enrollees of Lebanon Family Health Service's "Be the One" parenting class have expressed a need for successful co-parenting techniques. This project will include several organizations working together to address community needs, shortages of programs, resources, and information available to young fathers in Lebanon County through the expansion of existing programs to increase inclusivity and participation. Five paternity tests will be subsidized to reduce cost burden on young fathers applying for ELECT resources; Mentor A Mother's custody workshop will be expanded to include a legal session with a lawyer present to draft custody agreements; and a co-parenting workshop will be offered to address the need for successful co-parenting practices. Historically, the custody workshop was offered exclusively to mothers, but will include father participation in 2020. We are seeking \$2,000.00 in funding support to implement these initiatives.

"There is a father absence crisis in America," according to the National Fatherhood Initiative. Lebanon County is not unique in this regard, and many Lebanon County fathers face barriers in accessing the few parenting resources available to them. According to the 2018 County Health Rankings, 33 percent of Lebanon County children live in a single-parent household, and U.S. Census data from 2018 shows single parent households are 4.4 times more likely to be maintained by the mother than the father. Comparing these two statistics against the total number of households in Lebanon County in 2018, which according to the Census was 53,281, we can estimate that approximately 19 percent of single parent Lebanon County households are led by fathers only.

Father absence harms children in various ways. According to the National Fatherhood Initiative, children raised in fatherless homes are twice as likely to drop out of high school, seven times as likely to become pregnant as a teenager, and four times more likely to live in poverty. Expanding existing programs to address needs identified by local residents can aid in lowering these statistics in Lebanon County by providing fathers with resources to obtain education, custody information, and parenting help. Children of parents served will also benefit as children with involved fathers perform better academically, benefit from a lower risk of maltreatment, and have better social and emotional well-being, according to the National Fatherhood Initiative.

The Lebanon County Teen Pregnancy Prevention and Support Network (TPPSN) operates under the Community Health Council of Lebanon County. Mentor A Mother, the Lancaster-Lebanon Intermediate Unit (IU13) Education Leading to Employment and Career Training (ELECT) program, Lebanon Family Health Services, and Domestic Violence Intervention (DVI) of Lebanon County are core TPPSN partners. TPPSN has offered free programs to fathers in the past, however these programs were not well attended. Instead of continuing to implement new programming to fathers, we are listening to the

needs of local residents and grant funds will be used to supplement and expand existing programs offered by ELECT and Mentor A Mother. Additionally, grant funds will be used to build upon a parenting workshop offered by Lebanon Family Health Services to cover the topic of co-parenting, a specific need identified by class enrollees.

As a core TPPSN partner, ELECT strives to support teenagers and young adults up to 21 years of age who are expecting a child or already have a child. ELECT helps enrollees gain their high school education, continue on to higher education, and secure a job. Enrollees receive biweekly visits from staff; grade and attendance tracking via a case manager; and information on job applications, healthcare, nutrition, and parenting. In the past, teen dads were ineligible to enroll in ELECT unless paternity had been established. This requirement was removed in December of 2019. However, establishing paternity is still an important step in providing young fathers the full benefits and opportunities of being an involved parent. ELECT has identified cases in which young fathers state they want to be involved in their child's life, and establishing paternity can aid in their opportunities to do so. Furthermore, funding five paternity tests will overcome the barrier of cost for young fathers wanting to establish paternity, but who are unable to cover the costs associated with the test.

The expansion of existing programs to include fathers further develops their opportunities to be involved in their child's life and receive resources despite financial adversity. Mentor A Mother has historically held custody workshops for their enrolled mothers. In an effort to support healthy father-child relationships, the next custody workshop will include father participation in addition to a legal session lead by a local family law attorney. An American Psychological Association article publication from 2014, authored by Dr. Richard A. Warshak states that "[t]he research supports the growing trend of statutory law and case law [regarding custody agreements] that encourages maximizing children's time with both parents. This may be even more important for young children in order to lay a strong foundation for their relationships with their fathers and to foster security in those relationships." The custody workshop and legal session will provide parents with information on healthy relationships, their legal rights as a parent, and provide the opportunity to create a custody agreement right then and there. Providing workshops and classes to parents have proven beneficial in the past, and help to engage the community and identify specific educational needs.

Related to this, parents enrolled in the "Be the One" parenting class offered by Lebanon Family Health Services have asked for help specifically regarding co-parenting. Imagine a situation where one parent is working hard to do right by their child, but feels like their ex-partner is undercutting that hard work. Of the 16 individuals who completed the October 2019 class, 50 percent are actively co-parenting. To address this need within this community, a co-parenting workshop will be offered and led by Ellen Kellner, a published author who also has lived experience in this area. The workshop will cover lessons on parenting together, communication, and discipline. The Fragile Families and Child Wellbeing study showed cooperative co-parenting led to lower levels of maternal stress, which has numerous benefits for children. Attendees will be provided with Ellen Kellner's book, "The Pro-Child Way: Parenting with an Ex", which discusses in detail 46 situations often faced by divorced parents, and how parents can overcome them and react positively. As the instructor lives out of state, the workshop will be conducted by means of video conference and will support co-parents in the Lebanon county area from local organizations and existing workshops including, but not limited to, Be the One parenting workshops, Mentor A Mother, and ELECT.

PARTNERSHIPS: We are equally invested in providing this project and success is dependent upon all organizations and shared roles although one entity serves as the applicant for this grant. Our application includes a letter from each partner that states their role in this relationship.

1. Education Leading to Employment and Career Training (ELECT). The primary role of this organization will be to identify young fathers who are eligible for ELECT services and complete the enrollment of benefits process. ELECT will additionally organize paternity test appointments and administer the tests.

COMPARABLES

Lebanon Family Health Services offers a free, four week parenting workshop to the community multiple times a year. Separate classes are offered for parents of young children and adolescents. The focus of these workshops are building resilient children and families, and over time participants of this workshop have asked specifically for help regarding co-parenting. This work is beneficial to our project as it educates and provides parents in the community with parenting skills, but is also different from our project, as our work seeks to fulfill the specific need for co-parenting techniques in the community. The National Fatherhood Initiative has shown children with actively involved parents, especially fathers, benefit more economically, socially and emotionally than do children from a one parent household, especially ones without fathers. Secondly, our project seeks to address the shortage of workshops covering topics of custody and legal rights. Mentor A Mother has historically held a custody workshop open to mothers enrolled in their services. This is similar to our proposed project, however our project will include a legal session with father participation in addition to the existing custody session.

ASSESSMENT & IMPACT

- 6a. What will project success look like? Provide a brief overview of the project's key outcomes, outputs, and/or other results of success.**

Project success will include meeting enrollment goals and the level of topic knowledge participants leave the workshop with. We aim to provide five free paternity tests to young fathers interested in enrolling for ELECT services during the fiscal year. By the end of the fiscal year, 80% of the eligible fathers will have enrolled in ELECT services and maintain their enrollment until they receive their high school education. The enrollment goal for the custody workshop is ten fathers and ten mothers. By the end of the custody workshop, 60% of the parents without a current custody agreement will have had one created at the workshop with help from the lawyer. We have identified a goal of enrolling 20-25 individuals in the co-parenting workshop, of which 90% will be able to identify five communication strategies which aid in successful co-parenting by the end of the workshop.

Project success will be measured and documented through a variety of methods, including numbers served, documents generated, surveys, and value statements. Numbers served and numbers maintained will be utilized to measure project success for supplying fathers with free paternity tests. Custody workshop success will be measured by number of custody agreements created. Project success of the co-parenting workshop will be measured through surveys and value statements at the end of the workshop to identify how much knowledge participants leave the workshop with and how valuable they found the lessons covered. Numbers served will additionally be used to measure output success of both the co-parenting workshop and the custody workshop.

FUNDING & SUPPORT

If not funded at the level requested, all components of the project will not be able to be implemented as stated. Partial grant funds will be used to subsidize paternity test costs to increase male participation in ELECT. Without the requested funds, we are unable to subsidize such costs. Grant

funds will be used to contribute to the costs of a custody workshop and legal session. If not funded at the level requested, this event will still take place, but may not be able to offer the full benefits of all sessions and guest speakers to participants.

We are seeking \$2,000.00 from TFEC to implement Be a Dad Influence. In-kind contributions totaling \$500.00 will be offered by the Community Health Council of Lebanon County and the Community in Schools coordinator in terms of time. The Community in Schools coordinator will assist with recruitment and alternative locations for the co-parenting workshop at no charge. Although some venues will provide rental space free of charge to non-profits, the co-parenting workshop requires use of video conferencing technology, which may result in a technology fee charge due to staff members needing to be present to assist. Mentor A Mother will provide \$500.00 in additional funding for the custody workshop and legal session, allowing the workshop to include multiple speakers, presentations, and a lawyer who can write-up custody agreements. The Community Health Council of Lebanon County will also provide \$175.00 in additional funding towards the co-parenting workshop.

The Community Health Council of Lebanon County did end 2019 with a budget surplus of approximately \$93,000.00. Of the amount, \$90,912.00 is earmarked for our other initiatives. The Teen Pregnancy Prevention and Support Network currently has a budget surplus of \$2,553.00 with approximately \$2,000.00 allocated to another grant expenditure.

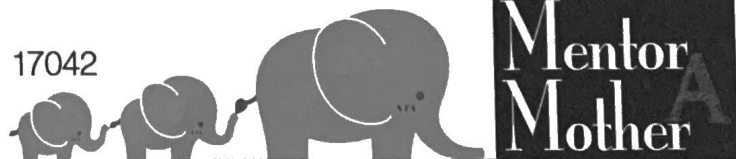
