Organization's Mission Statement

Compass Immigration Legal Services' mission is twofold. First, we provide accessible, high-quality trauma-informed immigration legal services to individuals, families, and businesses who could not otherwise afford the cost of a private attorney or law firm. Second, we serve as a community resource for immigrants and service providers alike, offering workshops, webinars, and other trainings on a variety of pertinent immigration law or immigration law adjacent topics.

Organization History (Do not exceed this page)

Headquartered in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, Compass Immigration Legal Services (CILS) began in 2019 as a response to our community's need for accessible and affordable services and education about U.S. Immigration policy and deep understanding that we are, truly, a "nation of immigrants." Our service area covers all of Central Pennsylvania. Currently, we have clients from Chambersburg to Lebanon and from Scranton to York.

CILS is not a traditional immigration law office or firm. Rather, it is a non-profit offering immigration legal services. All clients are charged fees for services at a rate that is affordable to them according to an analysis of their income level and unique financial situation. For those clients who cannot afford to pay any fees, CILS maintains a "Charity Care" program for in-house or external pro-bono placement.

Shortly after we opened, CILS realized that a number of our clients were eligible for humanitarian immigration relief such as asylum, T visas (for victims of trafficking), or U visas (for victims of terrible crimes). But, they could not afford to pay any legal fees at all. To better serve their needs and prevent the over-burdening our our "Charity Care' program, we created our Humanitarian Law Clinic (colloquially known as our "Asylum Clinic"). Staffed by attorneys and also by legal interns from Dickinson and Widener Law Schools and funded by grants and donations, it provides humanitarian immigration legal services to the most vulnerable.

Although CILS primarily provides family-based and humanitarian immigration services to those in need, our organization is also a resource for the community. In that latter capacity, we offer family safety trainings and "Know Your Rights" workshops for immigrants in need. We also offer workshops, webinars, and other trainings for local non-profit organizations, businesses, places of worship, community centers, health care providers, and others interested in learning how to help meet the needs of immigrants to our region. (Recent topics include the latest developments in immigration law, DACA, Religious Worker Visas, and cultural competency in an anti-racism context.)

Currently, Compass Immigration Legal Services is the only provider of low or no cost legal services to those seeking asylum in Central Pennsylvania. Our project involves expanding our Humanitarian Law Clinic to include a DOJ Accredited Representative Program to address the need for more local immigration law practitioners in a way that will produce professionals with the expertise required to provide competent, skillful immigration legal representation. This is an "upstream" project, because it directly addresses the problem – a lack of representation – at its source by providing high-quality, academic training led by attorneys with decades of professional experience.

Recent changes in United States Immigration law have caused historic rates of denial among asylum applicants. Affirmative applications, heard locally at USCIS' asylum office in Newark, New Jersey, currently have an approximately 80% denial rate. Defensive applications, heard locally at the nearest Immigration Court, in York, Pennsylvania, have an average denial rate of 78%.

Most asylum seekers appearing in the York Immigration Court are not represented by an attorney, as hiring a private attorney is cost prohibitive. Applicants who are able to afford an immigration attorney account for the majority of the 22% of cases won. The statistics relative to affirmative asylum are even starker. It is unlikely an affirmative asylum applicant appearing in Newark, New Jersey, will, without the help of an attorney, prevail in his or her case.

Consequently, competent, experienced legal counsel is a necessity. At this time, Compass Immigration Legal Services is the only organization providing low or no cost legal services to those seeking asylum in Central Pennsylvania. Moreover, as the few attorneys who practice asylum law turn their efforts to taking more affirmative and defensive asylum cases, they are left with less time for other types of immigration representation – adjustments of status, DACA applications, and similar.

In order to address this lack of representation, CILS is expanding its Humanitarian Law Clinic to include a Department of Justice (DOJ) Accredited Representative Program (CILS' DOJ AR Program). Grant funds will be used to help achieve this expansion.

Federal regulations allow non-attorney Accredited Representatives to provide immigration legal counsel and representation to individuals seeking immigration relief. In order for someone to become an accredited representative, they must be recognized by the DOJ as having completed rigorous training in immigration law. Moreover, they must be affiliated with a non-profit that has been recognized by the DOJ, as well. There are two levels of accredited representative.

Of course, CILS is working to become a recognized non-profit so that we can hire individuals who have become accredited. In this manner, we can expand our immediate ability to represent clients. However, our goal is much broader. The second part of our mission is to provide education, both to immigrants and to community providers. We genuinely believe that only through education the changes necessary to create parity and true justice for individuals intending to immigrate to the United States can be achieved.

With this project, therefore, we intend to further that essential education to become a training site for accredited representatives. Currently, the closest trainings all occur outside of Central Pennsylvania. This makes attendance difficult for those potential accredited representatives who are continuing to work during their training.

Our primary outcome will be the development of various curricula for the 40-hour trainings. Other, secondary outcomes will be the allocation of practitioner hours to do the administrative work necessary for the creation of the program, and the successful enrollment, education, and matriculation of our first class of students. Project success will be the creation of a self-sustaining DOJ Accredited Representative program.

Project success will be measured and documented via student and affiliate surveys, the number of students enrolled, and an evaluation of performance metrics built into the curricula.

FUNDING & SUPPORT

If this project is not funded at the level request, we will be able to implement the project with the assistance of donations and additional grants, but our timeline will be extended considerably, perhaps taking years to achieve.

This project will cost approximately \$15,000. We are requesting \$10,000 with this grant. The remaining we expect to receive via donations and additional grants.

In 2019, CILS was only in operation for two fiscal quarters. Our operating budget was \$71,799.04. We finished the year with a \$5,967 deficit, for just those two quarters. Although the requirements necessitated by the Covid-19 crisis are a factor, we expect to handle this deficit by increasing our marketing and donor development programs.

CILS is focused on fostering a climate of inclusion. This is reflected in our hiring practices, our client representation, and our educational philosophies. Curricula will be created with the advice and oversight of individuals knowledgeable in combating the systemic ills of institutional racism/xenophobia, sexism/gender discrimination, ableism, and similar. Materials will, ideally, be translated into multiple languages. Students will of course be accepted into the program with an eye to parity and helping nurture DOJ Accredited Representatives who are members of specific communities in need (for example, individuals from the Bhutanese community, the Nigerian community, or similar).

Compass is positioned to create positive social change. Recent changes in United States Immigration law have caused an incredible increase in the need for immigration legal services. Indeed, the need is great, since Pennsylvania is also home to an increasing number of immigrants. About 1 in 14 residents of the state is an immigrant. Support for CLIS to develop various curricula for the 40-hour trainings and to become a training site for accredited representatives is, therefore, critical at this time of challenge and change.
