CVAS returns lost pets to their owners, place adoptable pets with responsible owners, prevent cruelty to animals through investigations of complaints received. Promote responsible pet ownership through humane education, holds Rabies Clionic's for the public once a year, visit schools to educate the children about pet overpopulation provide pet therapy to nursing homes. Through contributions from private individual's and organizations, the shelter maintains its dedication to animals. CVAS's goal for a low-cost Spay/Neuter clinic will promote responsible pet ownership and reduce uncontrollable animal breeding (example 1+1=420,000, one female cat and offspring result in 420,000, kittens in seven years. The solution to the problem of pet overpopulation is to spay and neuter your cats. This clinic is offered to owner's who couldn't otherwise afford to have their pets spayed or neutered. The residents in Franklin County area, 11 townships can participate in this program. This program has become so popular there is no need to advertise for appointments as there is always a waiting list. CVAS's goal is to promote public awareness in this Spay/Neuter Clinic and this clearly indicates that the community is responding and coming together with CVAS in our mission in spaying and neutering their pets to help reduce overpopulation of unwanted pets.

Grant funds will be used to implement our low-cost spay/neuter clinc for pet-owners who couldn't otherwise afford to have their pets spayued and neutered. Due to the demand and success of this clinic we no longer need to advertise for appointments as there is always a waiting list and usually

three to four months ahead. CVAS is currently spaying and neutering up to 50 to 60 cats a month due to the demand. The single most important thing that CVAS can do to save cats from all of the suffering and death that their overpopulation causes is to spay and neuter. The shelter will start seeing rates of incoming animals in the shelter go down, overburdened and euthanization within the shelter going down as well but it is going to take time. As a result this clinic will eliminiate overpopulation and burden with unwanted animals within our community. This clinic is offered to the residents in Franklin County area which includes 11 townships and growing. With the continued progress and success of this program it is our mission to offer this service for dogs in the very near future.

 - The pet owners Spay/Neuter Clinic will make a notble impact on the community by promoting responsible pet ownership and public awareness. Pet Owner's will become aware of their responsibility in owning a pet and the need to have their pet spayed and neutered. CVAS's goal is to eliminate overpopulation and burden of unwanted animals. CVAS knows that implementation of the Spay/Neuter program, working together with the community will make a definite difference in our community and pets, and CVAS is starting to see a huge within the community.

 - With the help of staff, Vet Tech students, livcensed Vet Tech's and volunteer's, certificates are given to each pet owner for each pet and entered into a data system for all spayed/neutered animals. As a result the spay/neuter program will eliminate overpopulation and burden of unwanted animals within the community and promote responsible pet ownership and public awareness.

 - The Cumberland Valley Animal shelter is seeking grant in the amount of \$5200.00, from TFEC. CVAS is not seeking other funding sources but will continue our fundraisers, special events and donor request to help in funding this very important mission. In addition, each pet owner is charged \$30.00, to neuter male cats and \$45.00, to spay female cats. All cats must have rabie shots prior to surgery and if this has not been done that they are charged an additional \$10.00 to have a rabie shot to their pet. This also includes the test for leukemia which must be done prior to surgery. All monies coming in for these charges goes back into the cost for the vaccine for rabies shots and other test that need to be done to their pet. In addition, cost have increased for all medications and vaccine's, veterinarian's causing the project budget to increase for the grant request.

 - For CVAS's mosty recent fiscal year 2018, there is a revenue of \$713,041.00 and expenses of \$752,000.00, being in a deficit ending in \$38,959.00. short from absent donations, which very from year to years. CVAS relies on Public donations for its operations and/or grants. In addition special events, fundraisers are held every year to meet the demands of the shelter's operation and care for the animals.

To the Franklin County Foundation for Enhancing Communities:

I am writing this letter with the purpose of supporting the Cumberland Valley Animal Shelter's request for a grant from your organization. I can show my support in two ways; that of a Licensed Veterinary Technician, and that of the high school Veterinary Assisting program instructor at CareerTech. I have assisted with the shelter's low cost spay/neuter clinic for 4.5 years. As a technician, I aide in sedating the cats, giving vaccinations, pain medications, flea treatments, and microchips. As an instructor, I have my senior students responsible for performing the surgical preparation, the sterilization of surgical packs, and the recovery of the cats.

As an instructor of students, grades 10-12 who come from a variety of school districts including Chambersburg,
Greencastle, Waynesboro, Shippensburg, and Tuscarora, I am responsible for educating and preparing them for success in the
veterinary field. One skill that these students must master is that of surgery. By being able to assist with Cumberland Valley
Animal Shelter's clinic, my students are able to have extensive firsthand experience with surgeries. Without this monthly
exposure to a great cause, my students would only be able to hear and see demonstrations through shadowing at local clinics,
videos, etc. This opportunity also allows my students to meet the clinical hour requirement for them to sit for a national
examination given by the National Association of Veterinary Technicians in America. If they pass this exam, they receive their
Approved Veterinary Assistant certificate. About ¼ of my students go right into the field, either in a vet clinic, or in grooming;
half go onto further their education in fields like Veterinary Technology, Biology, or Pre-Vet. The monthly clinics are
invaluable- not only giving them the opportunity to practice, but to become confident and therefore ready for the field or postsecondary education. It is also giving them crucial life skills: teamwork, responsibility, leadership, attention to detail, etc.

As a Licensed Veterinary Technician, I can also support this clinic based on my previous experience in the field. Many low-income families are not able to spay, neuter, or get their pets necessary vaccinations/ flea treatments/ etc. unless there are opportunities like this. I have seen countless families struggle with having to find homes for unwanted kittens and puppies; many of whom end up at animal shelters like CVAS. I have also seen the pets suffer from conditions such as testicular cancer or pyometras- all because their owners were unable to afford the preventative care, i.e.: spaying and neutering.

I thank you for considering a grant for this wonderful clinic. Your help will ensure that CVAS can continue to provide this preventative care and therefore healthy well-being of countless cats that come through. Your help will also ensure my students can continue to get this clinical experience in surgeries, therefore providing confident young adults for Pennsylvania's workforce, or its post-secondary schools.
