Dauphin County Library System (The Library) builds community and transforms lives by connecting people, ideas, and opportunities.

# Organization History (Do not exceed this page)

Harrisburg Public Library was founded in 1889 as part of an emerging progressive movement that valued free, democratic access to and exchange of information. Sara Haldeman Haly, heiress of a prominent Harrisburg family, left a sizeable bequest and her estate donated her extensive riverfront garden to The Library. The Library opened in 1914 with 10,000 books and 5,000 cardholders. Since that time, and in every era, The Library has been responding to community needs, ensuring equalizing access to books and media, and adapting to remain relevant. In 1925, a childrens room was added; 1970 saw the introduction of books on cassettes; and VHS joined the collection in 1983. Internet access became available in 1995; DVDs premiered in 2001; and eBooks appeared in 2011.

The Library now has grown to eight libraries in Dauphin County with millions of resources, touching more than 97,000 households with well over a million items borrowed per year. In addition, The Library partners with other organizations to extend its reach in the community with off-site programs at senior living facilities, in prisons, at homeless shelters, and at day cares. In the current pandemic, The Library continues to respond quickly, adapting to online community programming, implementing curbside pick-up service, retraining more staff to assist with online resources, and making Zoom available free of charge to the community. As we prepare for continued outreach in the post-pandemic world, we pay special attention to programming that addresses existing community needs – like early childhood education – that have been exacerbated by the pandemic.

## **PROJECT SNAPSHOT**

1. Capture your UPstream project and the community need it seeks to address in 200 words or less.

Life in the Capital Region, a community needs assessment conducted by TFEC, documents a lack of preschool programs. Seventy-five percent of preschoolers within Cumberland, Dauphin, and Perry Counties are without access to high-quality preschool programs. Preschool programs significantly improve literacy, language, and math skills; reduce special education placements; and increase high school graduation rates. Where preschool programs are publicly offered, they are at risk of being defunded during difficult times such as those brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic. Private preschool programs are difficult to find, and cost presents a barrier for many families. For every dollar spent on preschool programs, \$17 may be saved in services and benefits later in life.

Stepping Stones to Milestones offers a solution to the gap in education and respects families as primary teachers. Developed by a team of educators and librarians, Stepping Stones to Milestones encompasses four programs: three story-time programs that follow children from birth to age six, and a preschool program that utilizes the Pennsylvania State Early Learning Standards.

The programs are interactive and family-based and designed to give the needed knowledge and materials to encourage families to extend learning into the home.

Stepping Stones to Milestones is designed to address the documented community need for early childhood education throughout Dauphin County. Studies show children who have access to high-quality early childhood educational opportunities show improvements in literacy, language, and math skills; are less likely to need special education; and are more likely to graduate high school. Pennsylvania does not mandate school districts provide either preschool or kindergarten, so districts that struggle financially may not provide those services. And where they do exist, the programs are vulnerable to budget cuts. Life in the Capitol Region, a community needs assessment conducted by The Foundation for Enhancing Communities, suggests that 75% of children lack access to preschool. The COVID-19 pandemic is exacerbating the problem as school budgets tighten, many school classrooms remain closed, and more responsibility is laid on families to act as educators. Truly an "upstream" program, Stepping Stones to Milestones fills the gap in early childhood education services, thus supporting better long-term outcomes and supporting parents as educators during crucial early years, an emerging need that will be heightened during the pandemic.

Stepping Stones to Milestones encompasses four progressive, family-centered programs that follow children from birth through age six. It offers age-appropriate learning opportunities coupled with family tips and education that extend learning into homes. Together, the programs offer a comprehensive and cohesive structure in a familiar setting, with wrap-around materials and services. The focus is not to teach children literacy, but to teach families how to be teachers.

Educators and librarians have developed a suite of programs:

Born to Read: Birth to 18 months. This thirty-minute program introduces sounds, language, music, and rhythm.

Toddler Storytime: 19 to 35 months. This forty-five minute program builds on music and rhythm to introduce stories, singing, movement, and fingerplay, enriching language and motor skills.

Preschool Storytime: 3 to 5 years. This forty-five minute program begins basic reading skills, comprehension, and imagination.

Cruise into Kindergarten: 5 years (and up) who will be entering kindergarten in that calendar year. Moving beyond literacy, this program introduces a Pennsylvania State Early Learning Standard curriculum with STEM, animal studies, arts, and other extended learning opportunities.

Each program is family-based, with adult tips and education integrated to build the family as primary educator. Suggestions for home play, activities, books, videos, and music are provided and families are often given take home materials.

Each program is offered once per week, during six five-week sessions at each of our eight branches located throughout Dauphin County and including a location in Lower Paxton Township, Elizabethville, Millersburg, Lykens, Hummelstown, and three locations in Harrisburg.

A tracking and rewards program offers children and families incentives such as free books carefully selected to portray and appeal to the diversity of families in Dauphin County, and completion certificates as participants graduate to the next program level.

Resourced with online meeting software and other supports, The Library was quickly able to adapt the program to support online instruction and curbside pickup of learning materials during the initial COVID-19 closure. This strength will allow The Library to quickly adapt should the need arise again. Because the programs are meant to support in-home family-supported learning, the content lends itself well to such adaptations.

Grant funds will be used for planning, supplies, rewards, and staff educators to run the 960 programs that are part of Dauphin County Library System's Stepping Stones to Milestones program.

Stepping Stones to Milestones encompasses four progressive programs that follow children from birth to age six. The programs each run six five-week sessions throughout the year and at each of our eight library branches located throughout Dauphin County. Each program runs once per week. Dates are rolling, and both dates and locations are secured.

**SINGLE ORGANIZATION STATEMENT**: Dauphin County Public Library is solely responsible for the Stepping Stones to Milestones program. While The Library relies on a wide network for many of its programs, it is uniquely structured to plan and implement the Stepping Stones to Milestones program. Childrens librarians and educators create the program, librarians deliver the program, and

The Library has the resources and physical space to support the program, as well as provide a plethora of wrap-around supports.

**PARTNERSHIPS**: We are equally invested in providing this project and success is dependent upon all organizations and shared roles although one entity serves as the applicant for this grant. <u>Our application includes a letter from each partner that states their role in this relationship.</u>

**COLLABORATIONS:** We are working with other organizations to make this project happen, but we serve as the lead organization for this grant opportunity and our project success is enriched by, but not dependent upon, our collaborators. We know of no other program that replicates Stepping Stones to Milestones in its comprehensive nature or in its focus on families as primary educators. There are preschools, Head Start programs, and some community literacy programs. However, barriers to those programs exist such as cost, age requirements, transportation, and registration criteria. Dauphin County Library System hosts its program in eight locations, the program is free, programs are available for all preschool age ranges, and there is no registration criterion.

#### **ASSESSMENT & IMPACT**

- **6a.** What will project success look like? Provide a brief overview of the project's key outcomes, outputs, and/or other results of success.
  - Ultimately, success is measured by participants prepared for kindergarten and families empowered to act as first educators. We track attendance, parents' confidence as first educators, the number of books distributed, and the number of children who complete the entire program. The Library is seeking ways to work with local schools to gather kindergarten readiness data from program participants.

  - The evaluation process will include a survey before and after each five-week session. The survey used will be the Early Learning survey generated from Project Outcome with additional questions to determine parents' confidence level with being their child's first teacher. Project Outcomes is a survey tool developed by the Public Library Association that compares the data gathered with national averages to determine if desired outcomes have been met. The surveys will be distributed

through email before and after each five-week session, with digital and paper copies of the survey available in The Library.

Also measured will be: attendance, number of incentive books distributed, and number of participants who complete the program from entry to graduation to kindergarten. Goals for 2021 will be a return to 2019 data in each category.

#### **FUNDING & SUPPORT**

  - The Library seeks \$10,000 of the \$74,798 project total from TFEC's Upstream. Additional revenue of \$64,798 is being sought and includes additional grants and private donations.

The Library ended 2018 with a deficit of \$563,442, representing about 7% of the budget. The Library is making purposeful investments in development and fundraising to address that deficit.
