The Center Point program offers an alternative educational setting for delinquent and truant youth. The Weekend Alternative Program offers at-risk youth a community-based alternative to detention from Friday evening to Sunday. Both programs use evidence-based curriculums to improve behaviors and decision-making skills.

Youth come to the Diakon Wilderness Center to find a second chance at growing into healthy adults. By implementing Restorative Practices in our Center Point and Weekend Alternative Programs, we will give youth the skills they need to build healthier relationships, deal with conflict, and make better decisions in their future. Both staff and students will engage in affirmative conversations on a daily basis to address problems and communicate concerns. This will result in improved behavior and better conflict medication skills.

Diakon seeks to give youth who have made a mistake in life a second chance at becoming healthy, law-abiding adults. Numerous studies have shown that system-involved youth are more likely to experience a host of unhealthy outcomes including but not limited to unemployment, substance abuse, dropping out of high school, and incarceration. If we can intervene early, before the youths reach adulthood, and teach youths how to communicate, make better decisions, deal with conflict, and form healthy relationships, we can help them avoid becoming one or more of these statistics. By reaching these youths upstream, we can give them the skills that they need to succeed in adulthood.

Restorative practices are processes that proactively build healthy relationships and a sense of community to prevent and address conflict and wrongdoing. Through this proposal, grant funds will be used to train Diakon staff in restorative practices through the International Institute for Restorative Practices (IIRP) and implement these practices in Center Point and the Weekend Alternative Program. Students in these programs are delinquent and/or truant youth, many of whom have difficulty forming healthy relationships. Students age 12-18 have been court-ordered to Diakon or have been referred by their school districts because they are failing to thrive in a traditional school setting. Restorative practices help students understand the consequences of their choices and actions, learn to deal with conflict, and form healthy relationships.

The Diakon Wilderness Center has already begun to implement restorative practices such as such as restorative conferences and circles. Jeremias Garcia, Center Point Director, has received train-the-trainer training on these practices and has been sharing his knowledge with Wilderness Center staff. However, in order to fully implement restorative practices and see the full impact they can have with this at-risk population, we are proposing to conduct on-site trainings with IIRP to fully implement restorative practices across Wilderness Center programming.

Grant funds will be used to help fund a project to train 15 Center Point and Weekend Alternative Program staff members through two two-day trainings with IIRP — one training focused on trauma and a second on restorative leadership development. Since the maximum recommended class size

is 35 – the training will also be made available to the Capital Area Intermediate Unit instructors and teachers or administrators from our partner school districts.

This project will also send Mr. Garcia to a Train-the-Trainer Restorative Conference for two days to bring additional training resources to Diakon. The project also includes the purchase of handbooks, posters and other supplies.

Once funding is secured Diakon will work with IIRP to schedule one two-day conference in March and one two-day conference in April. In the event that COVID-19 would prevent an in-person training, the training can be made available online. Otherwise, the training will take place at the Diakon Wilderness Center campus in Boiling Springs (Cumberland County). Supplies will be ordered in the Spring to coincide with the timeing of the two all-staff conferences.

The dates for the Train-the-Trainer Restorative Conferences in 2021 have not yet been made available.

The Diakon Wilderness Center is the only provider in the central Pennsylvania area offering the combination of academic, counseling and experiential learning for youth experiencing multiple challenges

ASSESSMENT & IMPACT

6a. What will project success look like? Provide a brief overview of the project's key outcomes, outputs, and/or other results of success.

Restorative Practices have been shown to improve community and family attachment, reduce conflict, and improve the overall behavior in a classroom. As a result of these practices, students will begin to have restorative conversations to resolve conflict and build relationships. Staff will use daily affective statements that communicate feelings and affective questions that prompt students to reflect on how their behaviors affect others. As the teachers and students progress from more informal practices to formal Circles and Restorative Conferences, a sense of community developes and students become more engaged. This creates a respectful, safe environment for the students to take full advantage of the opportunities that the Wilderness Center offers for growth and development.

We also propose the following outputs and outcomes.

Outputs:

- 15 Diakon instructors and up to 20 community partners will receive restorative practice training.
- 50 students will participate in weekly Circles (discussion groups).
- Two school-wide (Center Point) or program-wide (Weekend Alternative Program) Circles will take place each quarter.

Outcomes:

- The Center Point Program will reduce the number of out-of-school suspensions by 50% as compared to the previous school year. (Note: Center Point experienced 21 out-of-school suspensions in 2019-2020).
- The Center Point Program will reduce the number of in-school suspensions by 50% as compared to the previous school year. (Note: Center Point experienced 38 in-school suspensions in 2019-2020).
- The Weekend Alternative Program will reduce the number of behavioral discharges by 50% as compared to the prior year. (Note: In 2019 WAP experienced 10 discharges for behavior reasons).
- Students are assigned a "level" to indicate their behavior while participating in these programs. During the funding period, 75% of students will improve their behavior level in both Center Point and the Weekend Alternative Program.

Diakon has included staff time in this budget for data collection and analysis to both gauge project success and inform decision-making. Administrative staff will collect data each week from student

records to input into a database that monitors behavior, attendance and academic performance. This data will inform the outcomes described in question 6a.

 - We are seeking \$10,000 as part of a \$23,700 project to fully train our staff and implement restorative practices. Diakon has already secured a \$13,700 through other fundraising efforts (individual donations).

 - The Weekend Alternative Program operated at a loss of \$95,247 in 2019 and the Center Point Program had a surplus of \$211,145. The net surplus was reinvested back into Diakon Child, Family and Community Ministries which collectively operated at a modest net surplus for the year.
