FPHCR is a branch of a national organization. We opened in this community in 2010. We initially opened up in Dillsburg with our network of congregations providing overnight loding, meals, and hospitality to families. During the day we provided basic case management. Our facility is now located in Camp Hill. We have expanded to now include some basic parenting, budgeting, and life skills training. In 2018 we expanded to include a diversion/prevention program to assist families that call in prior to them becoming homeless, and in 2019 we added 2 transitional housing units to provide 2 families with housing and intensive case management for up to 1 year to work toward self-sufficiency.

PROJECT SNAPSHOT

1. Capture your UPstream project and the community need it seeks to address in 200 words or less.

Our current diversion program needs to be expanded to include more intensive case management, skill-building classes in the areas of financial literacy and good tenancy, and we want to be able to assist families with paying bills that will keep them out of homelessness. We have received some funding from our Family Promise National office in order to expand this program and are looking for matching funds (per the requirements of the grant we received from National) to continue to expand it to better serve and equip these families. We believe that by combining case management, skill-building classes, and paying for bills on an asneeded basis that we will decrease family homelessness in our community by a significant amount.

FPHCR has been engaged in providing 3 different programs to serve families experiencing homelessness or close to homelessness. We started 10 years ago with a shelter program for families and have expanded in recent years to include transitional housing and diversion/prevention. We added the transitional housing units because we had partners willing to provide us with the facilities needed and because we identified that families often needed more than the 60-90 days in order to become stable. Therefore, moving families into a more long-term transitional unit allowed us to continue working closely with families and helping them take a step toward stability. We found this as a way to meet a need we saw.

Our diversion program came about in a similar way. We had so many families calling the Day Center, and we found we couldn't help everyone, for 1 of 2 reasons: the first being a lack of shelter space. We only had program capacity to provide services to about 10% of the families that called us. The second reason was that many families did not need shelter. They were calling prior to becoming evicted or because they were getting behind on rent and were trying to avoid homelessness. We started providing some services to these families. This became our diversion program. We mostly advocate for families in this program. We do not currently have the resources needed to pay back rent or to help families with financial hiccups but do take the opportunity to reach out to a landlord or provide other resources. This program has allowed us to increase how many people we serve by 16%. Being a resource and an advocate for families has opened up an opportunity for us to not only serve more families but to also assist families prior to them becoming homeless.

We are now looking for funding to transform our diversion program. We love that we can now advocate for families, but we want to do more. We applied for, and received, a grant from our National Family Promise office to expand our diversion program. We want to use these monies to go beyond being an advocate to providing case management to families, assisting to pay back rent or other bills to help families avoid homelessness, and to start offering skill-based educational programs, such as financial literacy and Keys to Good Tenancy. With this 3-pronged system, we believe we will not only be stopping families from becoming homeless but will also be equipping

them to not become on the brink of homelessness again. By providing case management and skill-based education in return for paying bills, we will be stopping homelessness in the current situation and preventing it from happening in the future as well. That is why we consider this to be a great upstream program.

The geographic area we serve is Cumberland, Dauphin, and northern York Counties. We serve families (must have at least 1 child under the age of 18 or be pregnant) from these communities. We define family to include any member of the household, including extended family members. Unlike many other shelter programs in our area, we are able to not only serve single mothers but also single fathers, intact families, families with teenagers, and gay and lesbian couples.

This program will serve families on the brink of homelessness in our community. We have described above how we came about with this program idea based on the needs of families we already serve or hear from regularly.

Grant funds will be used to provide case management directly to families, offer skill-building opportunities in the areas of financial literacy and good tenancy and pay short-term bill needs on an as-needed basis to keep families out of homelessness while equipping them to not experience homelessness again.

We have already started some diversion services with the monies we received from the Family Promise National grant but plan to expand programming (with intensive case management, classes, and paying bills as needed) starting in January. We will run most of the programming out of our Day Center, based in Camp Hill. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we may need to be more creative and use other locations to provide services. We don't know that yet as things may change, but the programming will all remain in our local community.

Christian Churches United provides some assistance with back rent and other bills but without much case management and follow-up on the other side. They are more of an immediate assistance program and strictly serve Dauphin County. There are 5 organizations in the area that run the United Way's Road to Success program: New Hope, Salvation Army, Tri-County OIC, Goodwill, and Perry County Literacy. This program includes intensive case management and skill-building courses to relieve any barriers to employment. These program serve various areas in our community. We cover a broader area and are including rental assistance as a part of our program, which makes it unique from The Road to Success program which, at this time, does not include any type of housing assistance.

ASSESSMENT & IMPACT

Projected outcomes:

- 1. We will increase the number of families we can serve in our diversion program by 15%.
- 2. We will increase services to these families which will result in families avoiding homelessness or shelter time.
- 3. Families will improve skills and confidence in the areas of financial literacy and good tenancy by 30%. We will define this through pre-and-post tests for our skill-based classes.

Our outputs include case management time, outreach, and staff time to prepare to present the materials. Since we are looking at purchasing new curriculums (also an output), our staff will need to prioritize time in learning the materials prior to being able to present them to our families. We will also need some portion of time to set-up our success measurements. We can utilize some of our existing programming in Salesforce but will likely need to add some new categories to it in order to track everything we want to track to demonstrate success and/or areas for improvement within this new program.

We will utilize some analytic opportunities through Salesforce to track how well our families complete the various aspects of this program and then the results (e.g. showing that a family has completed a budgeting class and then saved money to afford an apartment – that would be two different measures of success).

We also plan to provide pre-and-post-surveys to families when participating in skill-based classes so that we can see what knowledge families gained while taking the classes. These success measures will also help us to make changes to the programming as we continue to learn what our families need most to avoid homelessness in their current situation and for the future.

FUNDING & SUPPORT

 - As aforementioned, we have some grant funding already from our FP National office which requires matching funds. We will need to match these funds entirely (\$7,500 total) in order to receive the entire grant from National. If we are not fully funded that amount through this TFEC Upstream grant, we will need to get funding elsewhere for the match and because we want to have the proper funding to make this program a success.

 - We are seeking \$7,500 from TFEC UPstream. We have received \$5,000 from FP National and will receive another \$2,500 (already approved) once we have the matching funds. We are seeking assistance from some of our individual donors for the remaining \$5,000 of this project budget.

 - We ended this fiscal year (July 1-June 30) with a deficit. The deficit was \$508. Our budget was adjusted multiple times over the past year due to changes in staffing and COVID-19 adjustments that needed to be made. At the end of the fiscal year though, we came very close to lining up with our actual expenses.
