
### **COMMUNITY NEEDS ASSESSMENT SUMMARY**

### TOP PRIORITIES FOR FRANKLIN COUNTY



#### **HEALTH ISSUES**

- Obesity
- Adults are less physically active
- Health issues related to the physical environment, including poor air quality
- · Poor mental health, depression and suicide rate increase

#### **ECONOMIC HARDSHIPS**

- Rising economic disadvantage among school age children » 11% of children under 6 years are uninsured
- Roughly 1 in 4 residents report living paycheck to paycheck
- · People of color earn a significantly lower median household income
- · African American and Hispanic/Latino residents are disproportionately more likely to be uninsured





- Food insecurity rate: 11.4%
- · Number of food insecure individuals: 17,720

· Affordability has become a pressing issue, with median house prices and median rents increasing faster than income
