SCHOLARSHIP REFORM

On Friday July 8, Governor Tom Wolf signed into law HB1642, a sprawling public school system bill which includes a ban on scholarship displacement at public colleges and universities. This makes Pennsylvania the fourth state in the country to eliminate the practice of colleges and universities reducing a student's financial aid package when the student receives a private scholarship.

A statewide coalition of scholarship providers, including TFEC, initiated the call for elimination of scholarship displacement in 2018.

"This is wonderful news. As a community foundation, our duty is to carry out our donors' intent. When we award a scholarship to a student on behalf of a donor, and the university then reduces that student's financial aid package, that essentially eliminates the scholarship's benefit to the student, and defeats our donor's purpose in awarding the scholarship," said Janice Black

MESSAGE FROM ROBERT E. CAPLAN - CHAIR

The last half-year has been very challenging for the stock market. During the first six months of 2022, the S&P 500 dropped 20.6%, marking its worst first-half performance since 1970. Meanwhile, during that same time frame, the Dow had its largest first-half drop since 1962. And let's not even talk about the Nasdaq, which had its largest percentage drop in its history. All told, the events of the past six months have many people worried, and understandably so. But while things might seem bleak right now, the reality is that investors really shouldn't panic.



Many investors have seen large losses in their portfolios since the start of the year. But one thing you should always remember is that until you sell off investments when they're down, what you're seeing is a loss on screen. That isn't to say that an on-screen loss isn't unsettling. But if you leave your portfolio alone, history has shown there's an excellent chance that in time, your investments will recover their value so you don't wind up losing any money at all.

While the current state of the stock market, and the impact it may have had on your portfolio shouldn't cause you to lose sleep at night, the reality is that there are things that TFEC does to protect our assets from taking an undue hit. And perhaps the most important one is our portfolio is well-diversified. We accomplish this by holding diverse index funds. These passively managed funds don't impose the hefty fees you'll often find with actively managed mutual funds. At the same time, they offer built-in diversification.

Looking at your portfolio balance right now might make you want to bang your head against the wall or curl up in a ball and stay there for days at a time. But as difficult as it may be to see such extreme losses in your portfolio, try to remember that as long as you don't go off liquidating investments, chances are, those losses will only be temporary.

In fact, if you have extra money on hand, now's actually a good time to buy the S&P 500 Index at a discounted price. We don't know when the stock market will pull out of its current slump, but history has proven that we should not make any rash decisions while stock values are down across the board. The current state of the market will pass and will prove to be a bad memory in the future, as we saw in other troubling markets.

TFEC PARTNERS WITH THE BASICS



TFEC is proud to partner with The Basics, a Boston-based campaign aimed at assuring every child gets a great start in life. The Basics are five evidence-based parenting and caregiving principles that encompass what experts find is important for children from birth to age three. Every child from every background can benefit from routinely experiencing the Basics learning experiences, which include the list to the left.



In this issue we will highlight the first principle:
Maximize Love, Manage Stress

Children thrive when their world feels loving, safe, and predictable. When you express your love and respond to their needs, you teach them that they can count on you. As they grow, feeling secure in their relationships gives them the confidence they need to explore, learn, and take on life's challenges.

Additionally, young children are affected by a parent's emotions; whether they are happy or upset. It is important to find practical strategies that help manage stress. Caring for yourself helps you care for your child.

How to use Maximize Love, Manage Stress with your child:

1. Practice deep belly breathing with your child. It is good to practice this skill before you need it in times of upset. Emphasize that deep breathing is good to do before bedtime and anytime we are feeling anxious or stressed. Simply pause and take a minute to breathe.
2. When eating dinner or putting your child to bed, talk about all the things you did that day. What did you like best about the day? What did you like least? Sharing feelings creates an atmosphere of trust.

The mission of the Children's Home Foundation Fund, a committee advised endowment fund of The Foundation for Enhancing Communities, is to provide aid to economically disadvantaged children in Cumberland, Dauphin and Perry counties. This fund was established as a result of the dissolution of a private foundation. In accordance with this mission, funding priority will be given in the following areas: human services, especially programs which address needs for food, clothing and shelter; education; cultural enrichment and the arts; funding is restricted to programs serving only disadvantaged children in Cumberland, Dauphin and Perry counties. Multi-year funding requests will be considered, but may be granted conditioned upon investment return, confirmation of matching funds identified by the Grantee, and/or the availability of foundation funds (in the years following the initial year of funding).

A LOOK BACK ON THE IMPACT OF TFEC'S GRANTS

Community Cares

Mechanicsburg Area Community Foundation 2020 Grantee Recipient of \$3,048

Project and Community Need:

Cumberland Street Reach-Mechanicsburg addressed the community issue of homelessness in Mechanicsburg, PA during 2021 by providing support, services, and referrals to those who were at risk of or experiencing homelessness. The program is designed to engage, assess and combat common barriers for households that are at high risk of being evicted or are living on the streets, in encampments and in locations not intended for human habitation.

The program directly affected the homeless problem in Mechanicsburg by meeting at risk people right in their own community, ensuring it was accessible no matter how or where persons began seeking assistance. They provided for basic human needs, engaged with them, and provided case management and Coordinated Entry.

Assisting households with solutions to prevent and/or end homelessness while addressing root causes of homelessness (job insecurity, poverty, rental and utility assistance, referrals for medical and mental health services, etc.) is a priority for Cumberland Street Reach-Mechanicsburg.

Success:

Cumberland Street Reach-Mechanicsburg had an influential and positive impact as it eased some of the barriers associated with homelessness. The program allowed us to collaborate with other local community organizations in their efforts to reach and serve the homeless population in their own local neighborhoods. Strong collaborations that compliment but do not duplicate services increase the chances for success for households facing housing insecurity.

One such partnership was with UPMC for their "Street Medicine" clinic. This team travels weekly with a street outreach team throughout the county (including Mechanicsburg), providing medical support to anyone who is actively homeless. This clinic helps to address immediate medical concerns and provides a streamlined process for obtaining access to prescriptions and other medical services more quickly than traditional systems. In addition, the UPMC mobile drug and alcohol unit comes to their Resource Center weekly to provide substance abuse support to anyone in the community in need of it.

Nicodemus Center for Ceramic Studies

Project and Community Need:

Nicodemus Center for Ceramic Studies creatively shares its mission of spreading the joy of pottery with all levels and abilities, and through purposefully meeting the community where it is. From children's classes to visiting seniors at senior centers to hosting youth from local Girl Scouts troops, NCCS creates opportunities to share its love of creating pottery with all ages and abilities. NCCS also operates two active working pottery studios with a guild membership of over 40 ceramic artists of all levels, and a beautiful gallery for members to professionally display and sell their creations. The Master Artisan Series speaks to a need from emerging and advanced potters to receive instruction by professional potters in specialized techniques. This series supports continued learning and exploration by potters, eager to expand their knowledge, skills, and the quality of their product. These are highly specialized classes taught by professional artisans not readily available in our geographic area. The classes would enrich the individual artist and support expanded economic opportunity for the artists, while adding prestige and legitimacy to our local artistic community.

Success:

Success was the gain in knowledge from the students and the passing along of folk traditions to new practitioners.

FISCAL SPONSORSHIP CORNER

TFEC provides numerous programs and services to the community. One of these services is our Fiscal Sponsor Program. Fiscal sponsorship gives TFEC the ability to extend its nonprofit status to Projects so they operate under TFEC's 501(c)(3), raise tax-deductible contributions and use those funds to achieve community impact. Currently, TFEC proudly supports 72 Projects that are making a measurable difference in people's lives. In 2021, these Projects raised \$2,676,014 for community programming that focuses on five different areas of focus: Community Development, Health & Human Services, Arts & Culture, Education and Environment.

Harrisburg Firefighters Special Operations Foundation

All funds are used to outfit personnel or to purchase equipment for the team.

The purpose of our foundation is to pursue funding to assist with purchases for the Special Operations Teams of Harrisburg Bureau of Fire.

The main focus of our efforts has been the Harrisburg Bureau of Fire Dive 1.

This team assists Police and Fire Departments in a verity of calls. From finding evidence for criminal cases or recovering a loved one so family can have closure.

" We spent 18 months producing a beautiful portrait mural of 400 years of Lemoyne's history from a transportation lens and an event lens. Because we painted on a specialty cloth, we were able to "hang" the mural (like wallpaper) over a one week's time and celebrated with a community dedication and celebration in June of 2017."
